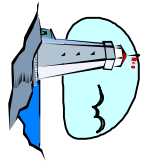

Today I'm going to pay my respect to the Pied Piper. Nope, I don't mean the tuneful fellow who led the rats out of Hamelin back in the idle ages and then did a similar act with the city's children when the city fathers refused to play that flute—playing exterminator for ridding their community of its rodent population. I'm talking about John Stinson of Bibb Avenue, Beckley. I've watched John play the Piper for the two years just past and my admiration for this unselfish worker for the young has grown with the months. How does he resemble the Pied Piper? Well, John goes wherever there's a meeting the Methodist Youth Fellowship of St. Mary's Methodist church should attend; and where John goes the church's bus goes because he drives it; and where the unpaid Pied Piper takes his bus, he takes it loaded with the youngsters of St. Mary's Methodist Church and their counterparts from the Methodist Child Care Center at Bradley. It is a simple formula with a pleasant result. A church bus plus a dedicated driver, youth worker equals religious education with a dash of fun for large numbers of young Christians between the ages of 12 and 18. I made John's acquaintance about two years ago when Betty and I began to follow daughter Ginny Lee and son Harry G. to District and Sub-District meetings of the Methodist Youth Fellowship. No matter where the meeting was, be it somewhere in Raleigh County or Oak Hill or Summerville or Babcock State Park or Camp George Washington carver, morning, noon or evening meeting; Pied Pier Stinson always arrived with his bus and his busload of young Methodists. Believe me when I say that without John's contribution, many of those meetings would have been rather sparsely attended. Not only was John the driver of the bus full of religious young Christians, but he was the one adult leader from the many churches represented in the Beckley Methodist District that the young District officers could always count on being present. Besides acting as bus driver, Dutch uncle, friend, big brother, chaperon, disciplinarian and father—for the moment for all the youngsters he transported to the meetings, John was a tower of strength and a source of good advice for all the participants at the gatherings. John's contribution for a better youth is all the more impressive when you consider that while two or three exuberant young Christians were a joy and a pleasure—a busload of exuberant young Christians can be quite a "cross to bear" to their chaperon—driver doing a solo act. Such charitable works could cause a lesser man to "lose his religion." I said earlier in this piece of plant news that Pied Piper Stinson was unpaid, but I think that when John listens to his young passengers sing their hymns, watches them conduct their meetings and hears them end their meetings with "May the Lord Bless You and Keep you...and give you peace..." he feels rich beyond his wildest dreams.



Pastor's Pen

This is a picture of the current church situation. As you remember we were 16% behind our budget in 2008 from what we actually spent and what we took in. As we look ahead in 2009 and reflect on 2008, let us remember our church families and the troubles that has filled some of their lives: financial difficulties, loss of jobs, deaths, surgeries, sicknesses, etc. We must love, support, encourage, help and pray for each other!

The finance sub committee of the Master Planning Committee was asked to reconvene to discuss raising funds for the second phase, a new sanctuary. This committee came together with several new members and discussed our current debt, our current fund-raising campaign, as well as economic conditions. Committee members are: Rose Ferree, Chuck Collins, Anne Fahrenkrog, Harry Kesterson, Mike Lewis, Pat Nobles, Cindy Prevatte, Mike Weaver and advice from John Faris, Ron Bruce, Chairman of the Deacons, and John Gambrell, Pastor.

We are thankful to all who have contributed to our current Building on Our Heritage campaign and at this point we are well on our way to meeting our commitments for the three year period. However, those commitments are just over \$1.3 million, and the total cost of the project so far is over \$3 million. To date, we have collected \$775,695. In 2008, the average monthly amount given for Building on Our Heritage was right at \$18,233. We need continuing support from everyone. The consensus of the Master Planning Finance Sub-Committee, after much prayer and discussion, is to make the following recommendations:

- We do NOT start building the new sanctuary at this time. We cannot afford to divert current gifting for the operating budget and the current building debt.
- Make better use of our current space.
- Pay off our current debt as fast as possible and build a reserve before starting the second phase.

Our current debt of \$2.9 million was converted to payments of principal and interest in October. At the current set payment of \$21,500 it will take 196 months to pay the loan in full (16 years) at current interest rate of 4.78%. The interest rate can fluctuate but can go no higher than 6%. To pay if off in three years, monthly payments need to be \$87,247 and would total \$3,140,883 (\$240,883 interest); in five years, monthly payments need to be \$54,823 and would total \$3,289,360 (\$389,360 interest); pay if off in 10 years, monthly payments need to be \$30,665 and would total \$3,679,808 (\$779,808 interest.) It is in our best interest to concentrate on paying this loan down as quickly as possible and saving as much interest as we can.

We believe that God wants us to build the new sanctuary. We need to trust in Him and believe that it will happen, in His time. We need to create renewed enthusiasm in our current three year (May 2007 through April 2010) campaign. This committee was asked by the church in the business meeting to continue to meet and address these issues prayerfully and diligently. We must pray for them, our church and our part in these matters.

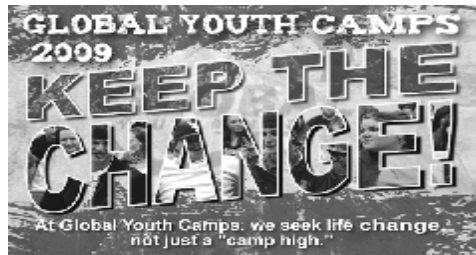

From Eric O. Schacht, Colonel, US Army

Thank you for your recent contribution to the Humanitarian Assistance program. As a part of our mission in Afghanistan we try to win over the hearts of the local Afghan nationals. Your contribution is a very important piece to support the Humanitarian Assistance drops. We were able to distribute many of these items that you supplied to the local population through these drops. Humanitarian Assistance allows Afghan National Security Forces to build relationships between themselves and the civilian population. We help them do this by providing food, clothing, and household supplies for predetermined villages. This is often done in concert with other operations such as medical outreaches, all of which are designed to rid the villages of Taliban influence. The recipients of the Humanitarian Assistance and your donated supplies are villages, refugee camps, hospitals and schools. Kids are a big focus of this program since Afghans (much like us) love their children deeply and want a much better future for them. The overall goal of this program is to legitimize the Afghan government in the eyes of the Afghan people, without creating dependency on these goods or to sustain a particular village. The Humanitarian Assistance program is a tool used to help prevent enemy forces from taking control of a village, school or nomadic group by helping the Afghan people look to their government for assistance and protection. When my troops watch the news, they often wonder why they never report on the great support we receive from organizations like yours. Thank you for your generosity and selfless support!
